From The Chair



Welcome to this first newsletter for 2021 and our apologies for the long silence.

It would be easy to blame the delays on Covid -19, but in all honesty we cannot say that. It is not that we have been affected other than the inconvenience by the lockdown but other matters have occupied our time in the past few months.

Amalgamation of Trusts

Firstly, we have amalgamated the Colin McLennan Memorial Trust into the Rehabilim Trust Inc. We did this after much discussion to avoid the bureaucracy that goes with charities reporting these days.

Both sets of returns were almost identical, both sets of returns required auditing and various questions to be answered, all identical. Given that we are a voluntary organisation and that members and supporters give up their free time to ensure we do the right thing for the disabled young people in Indonesia, it was unanimous that we amalgamate the two Trusts after taking legal advice.

Its important to note that nothing will change.

Covid in Indonesia The covid – 19 virus has hit Indonesia hard. Like many countries, whatever plan they had developed to combat it, that plan was never followed. A classic example is the UK (and America too) struggling for nigh on a year now and still people protest about lockdown and try to ignore it.

Indonesia was no different. Lockdowns were tried in the major cities but when Ramadan came, the lockdown rules were flouted openly. At the time of writing, Indonesia was recording one million cases of the virus and no doubt it will hit vulnerable people, the poor, and the disabled.

We have no reports of any of our students being affected and we hope it remains that way.

Riding for the Disabled (**RDA**) The Rehabilim Trust had been keen to see the first branch of Riding for the Disabled (RDA) established in Indonesia under the auspices of Yayasan Pembiaan anak cacat Malang (YPAC). Sadly the onslaught of wide scale Covid – 19 virus infections has forced the project to be put on hold.

Neighbouring city Surabaya is one of the worst hit areas for the virus along with Jakarta.

In addition, obtaining a lease on suitable land and recruiting trained staff under the prevailing conditions made the whole project unworkable at this stage.

The Trust had been holding monies on behalf of St Andrew's Presbyterian Church to assist in the setting up of an RDA, but the money will now be used for other projects at YPAC Malang.

We look forward to this new year with confidence that we can continue to offer disabled young people in Indonesia some hope and a second chance to better themselves.

All the very best for 2021 and stay safe.
